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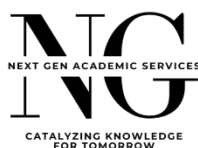

The book is useful for students, researchers, teachers, extension professionals, policymakers, development practitioners, and organizations working towards equitable and sustainable rural development.

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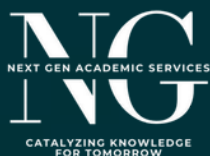
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
